Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from 2015.

Growing the economy by encouraging job creation was and remains my top priority. The tax-relief bill signed into law at the close of last year contains three key provisions I authored to help foster job creation and provide small businesses with the certainty they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. Another provision I authored that became law last year gives a boost to both Maine's economy and traffic safety. This provision permanently changed the federal law that previously had forced the heaviest trucks onto our country roads and downtown streets, rather than allowing them to use Maine's federal Interstates. In addition, I was glad to help secure another significant award for the University of Maine's deepwater offshore wind initiative, which has the potential to advance an emerging industry and create thousands of good jobs in our state.

Maine's historic contributions to our nation's defense must continue. In 2015, I secured funding toward a much-needed additional Navy destroyer, likely to be built at Bath Iron Works. Modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that I have long advocated for were also completed, as were projects for the Maine National Guard.

I was also deeply involved in crafting the new education reform law to better empower states and communities in setting educational policy for their students. The law also extends a program I co-authored that provides additional assistance to rural schools, which has greatly benefitted our state. A \$250 tax deduction I authored in 2002 for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies was also made permanent last year.

As a result of a scientific evaluation of the nutritional value of potatoes required by a law that I wrote, the wholesome fresh potato finally was included in the federal WIC nutrition program. I also worked on other issues important to Maine's farmers and growers, including research on wild blueberries and pollinating bees.

As Chairman of the Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have made combating veterans' homelessness a priority. This year's housing funding law includes \$60 million for 8,000 new supportive housing vouchers for homeless veterans. Since this program began in 2008, the number of homeless veterans nationwide has dropped by one third. Maine has received nearly 200 vouchers to support homeless veterans.

Last year, I became Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee. My top three priorities for the committee are retirement security, investing more in biomedical research, and fighting fraud and financial abuses targeting our nation's seniors. I advocated for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. The Senate also unanimously passed my bill to support family caregivers. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance and has already received more than 1,000 calls.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2015 ended, I cast my 6,072nd consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

I am so grateful that you've selected me to represent you in the Maine Senate for my first term. Dear Friends of Portage Lake:

It has been a privilege to serve the State of Maine since being sworn into the U.S. Senate.

Much of my time in Washington this past year has been devoted to the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Select Committee on Intelligence. Protecting our homeland and the people of Maine from terrorism and violence remains one of my top priorities. Through my work on the Armed Services Committee, I was able to secure several provisions in the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act that benefit Maine. The legislation authorizes the construction of an additional DDG-51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer that could be built at Bath Iron Works and expands the HUBZone program to stimulate economic growth at former military installations like the former Brunswick Naval Air Station.

Returning control to teachers, school districts, and states has also been a primary concern of mine. I am encouraged that the Every Student Succeeds Act has become law. It eliminates the burdensome requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act and ensures access to a quality education for all students. A provision I helped author in the bill will give states the opportunity to pilot the use of their own proficiency-based assessments in lieu of federally-mandated standardized tests. Also included in the bill are several measures I secured to promote local input, fund education technology initiatives, and explore new strategies to increase student access to the internet outside of school.

Communities across Maine have taken bold action to improve their broadband connectivity, and I have been proud to foster federal support for these types of projects. My amendments to the Every Student Succeeds Act will promote the type of work already occurring in Washington County, where students who lack broadband access are able to check out mobile hotspots from their local libraries. Additionally, a bill I cosponsored, the Community Broadband Act, helped pave the way for the FCC to enact rules protecting the ability of municipalities to invest in better broadband. I am excited by Maine's leadership on this important economic development issue and will continue to support local efforts in this area.

After extensive negotiations, the Senate passed a five-year transportation bill that will increase highway and transit funding in Maine and provide stability to improve our transportation infrastructure. The legislation contains provisions I cosponsored to cut red tape and improve predictability and timeliness by streamlining the federal permitting process for large infrastructure projects. Also incorporated in this bill are my provisions to relieve financial regulations on Maine's community banks and credit unions and to reauthorize the Export-Import Bank, a critical tool that supports communities and small business across the state.

Following my inquiries in the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, the National Park Service has announced they will begin exploring strategies to allow park visitors to purchase electronic passes online and will pilot the program at Acadia National Park. These passes would improve access to our nation's most treasured landscapes and would generate resources for years to come. I remain deeply engaged in preserving Maine's natural beauty and strengthening our outdoor recreation economy.

It is with solemn responsibility that I have focused my energy addressing the opioid epidemic in Maine. This work includes convening roundtables with a wide-range of health care and law enforcement professionals to combat addiction; introducing a proposal to safely dispose of excess prescription drugs; cosponsoring a

Senate-passed bill that addresses mothers struggling with addiction and the alarming effect it has on newborns; cosponsoring the TREAT Act, which expands the ability of medical specialists to provide life-saving medication-assisted therapies for patients battling heroin and prescription drug addiction; and calling on the Commander of U.S. Southern Command to increase efforts to stop the flow of heroin at our southern border.

I like to think of Maine as a big small town — and in a small town, the leaders are accessible and eager to listen. In that spirit, I've made it a priority to stay connected with people from all over Maine who e-mail, write, and call with suggestions or questions. If I can ever assist in your interaction with a federal agency, or you have thoughts, concerns, or personal input on a matter that is currently before Congress I hope you will contact me, let me know where you stand, and engage in this critical part of democracy. Maine Law requires that all vehicles 1995 and newer must have a title. When registering a new vehicle, here is a brief list of common items that are required in order for the Town to process your registration:

- Current insurance card
- Old registration if transferring any excise tax credit
- Current mileage
- Bill of sale and seller's title signed over to you (if private sale)
- Proof of sales tax paid and title application (if dealer sale)

When registering a recreational vehicle such as a boat, ATV or snowmobile bring your old registration to renew.

If <u>Dealer Sale</u>, bring the following items:

- Proof of sales tax paid
- Boat length and motor size (if registering a boat)

If Private Sale, bring the following items:

- Bill of sale with the serial number and the seller's name and address
- Boat length and motor size (if registering a boat)
- For trailer and boat sales, these must be separated on the bill of sale

TO THE CITIZENS OF PORTAGE LAKE

The Portage Lake Association is a local, non-incorporated organization that was formed in 1989 for the purpose of protecting the lake. For many years now, it placed a great deal of emphasis on educating both year-round and summer residents about the dangers posed to Portage Lake from both invasive water species and environmental factors such as lakeside application of phosphorous and other chemicals that can greatly degrade the water quality of the lake. That education has taken the form of information shared with the community through our annual newsletters, PLA-sponsored signage at strategic locations around the lake, and the personal communication efforts of our Courtesy Boat Inspectors that volunteer their time on weekends at the campground/boat launch.

As a result of our outreach, the membership in the Portage Lake Association has increased dramatically, and many members now make contributions over and above their annual dues for the purpose of further supporting our programs. As a result, we have accumulated an amount of funds that is larger than is normally associated of a small, non-incorporated organization. As we have pointed out to our members on a number of occasions, should Portage Lake experience an infestation of an invasive plant species such as Eurasian Milfoil in the future, the excess funds that we have accumulated would be spent very rapidly when applied to a lake wide remediation program.

We the Board of Directors along with the approval of the Selectmen and Town Manager have taken a large portion of the funds in on account within the books of the Town of Portage Lake. Withdrawals from this account in support of future PLA activities require approval of both the Town of Portage Lake and the PLA Board of Directors.

The Boat inspections for this year were 437 completed by 37 volunteers and our Lake Coordinator Ray Wakefield. Membership for this year was 142. The annual Loon count results of 17 adults and 0 chicks was done on July 18 by Susan Doyen and her group.

Summer 2016 will be the 10TH Anniversary of the Ring Of Fire.

The Portage Lake Association would like to thank everyone that participated in the 1ST Annual Portage Lake Chub Tournament. We had 41 entries and they caught a total of 377 LBS of Chub, Perch, Sunfish and Bullhead. Our goal is to take as many of these species out of our waterways as possible every year and hopefully make a difference in the quality of fish in Portage Lake. We are planning to have our 2nd Annual Tournament on the 3rd of July this year and hope to make it even more successful than last year. Our plan is to have a Children's , Adult and Party Boat category this year so everyone will have a chance to win a prize. FISH ON!!!



Portage Lake Historical Society 2015 Report

2015 has been a year of changes for the Portage Lake Historical Society. With the passing of our beloved Wilza Robertson, a Board member and one of our "founding fathers", we found ourselves faced with having to fill her shoes, and with the realization that we are losing our own history every day. Membership has been steady at about 32 members; our goal for 2016 is to increase that and try to pull in some younger people!

Another change for us was the inception of the Summer Historical Display in the voting room at the Town Hall. In 2015 the display's theme was the "Portage Lake School Systems". We had a lot of great donations to help make the display a success! Our theme for the 2016 display is going to be the Lumber/Logging industry in and around Portage Lake. We are always looking for donations for the display and help in setting it up. Even if you may not be a member of the Society, this history belongs to all of us and we all have a vested interest in keeping it alive.

In 2015, the Society spent approximately \$800 to purchase 44 black & white prints of scenes of Portage Lake from the early 1900s. These prints will be custom framed and displayed at the Portage Lake Municipal Building when the project is complete. We hope to have them all up for viewing by our Annual Ham Dinner at the Town Hall in June of 2016.

Some projects the Society has in the works is finding a permanent place we can call "home" for the many artifacts and other items that have been generously donated to the Society over the years. There are several older buildings in Portage Lake that would make a suitable home for the Society, and we actively considering them. Another project is a quarterly newsletter. In this newsletter, we plan to tell little snippets of Portage Lake's history, but also document things going on now—because what we are doing right now will be of historical importance for others in the future.

The Society meets the 4th Monday of every month from March to October, but you don't have to be a member to join us. We welcome anyone who is willing to promote Portage Lake's history and celebrate it in a positive way. Town of Portage Lake School Department

The Portage Lake School Department concluded its third fiscal year as an independent school entity on June 30, 2015.

The approved July 1, 2014 - June 30, 2015 school budget for Portage Lake totaled \$734,223 and was funded by \$474,525 in property taxes, \$199,142 in state subsidies and \$60,556 brought forward from the 2013-2014 fiscal year.

The current approved July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016 school budget is \$769,993 and is funded by \$459,525 in property taxes, \$215,188 in state subsidies and \$95,280 brought forward from last year. Please note that the amount required to be raised in property taxes for the school budget is again \$15,000 less than the prior year.

Portage began the current school year with 31 elementary and 11 secondary students. The enrollment numbers as of 01/12/16 were 26 and 11. The tuition rates for Portage students continues to increase as the expenses for SAD 32 remain level but their total student count continues to decrease.

An independent annual audit of the Portage Lake School Department was conducted by Felch & Company, LLC for the fiscal school year ended June 30, 2015. We were found to be in compliance with all laws and regulations and our financial information is accurate and complete. A copy of the audit is available for inspection at the town office.

RE: Ashland Ambulance Service

Ashland has experienced a 78% increase in educational costs over the past five years that has driven our mil rate to 27.5 mils and leaves the municipality fiscally unable to sustain the ambulance service without further assistance from the surrounding towns and plantations. Ashland needs to replace the Ambulance in the spring of 2016 and requests assistance from the participating communities to purchase this vehicle. The quote on a new ambulance is \$231,183.

The services newest ambulance was purchased in 2002, with approximately 150,000 miles of emergency service over county highways and logging roads. This, along with several moose and deer strikes have taken its toll on the ambulance and it has reached the point where its reliability is in question.

Ashland's ambulance service provides 24/7 paramedic staffing utilizing part time employees. The Ambulance Director works full time and fills in for shifts that he is unable to fill by part time employees.

The ambulance service covers 2563 square miles, providing service to Ashland, Masardis, Oxbow Plantation, Garfield Plantation, Nashville Plantation, Portage and the unorganized territories surrounding its coverage area. This area includes all the towns previously listed and encompasses from the bottom of Haystack on Route 163, the unorganized territory surrounding Scopan Lake, south on route 11 to Knowles Corner at the junction of routes 11 and 212, north on route 11 to the bottom of Soucy Hill and west to the Canadian border, covering the unorganized territories.

Ashland will pay for 60% of the ambulance and is requesting assistance as outlined in the following chart for the balance of the purchase. The interest rate is estimated to be 3% but could change and affect the final values. For example; assuming a 7 year loan Portage would pay an additional \$4,798.09 a year above its existing stipend.

This year, the Maine Acadian Heritage Council took the unprecedented decision of not offering educational grants to individuals or organizations. Instead, it created a FREE training workshop for teachers of the St. John Valley, in conjunction with the Acadian Archives/Archives acadiennes of the University of Maine at Fort Kent. Teachers met for a week to explore Acadian history and culture; how and why Acadians settled in the St. John Valley, Acadians of the diaspora; and the Bloodless Aroostook War with visits to the three forts in the area: Fort Kent, Me; Fort P'tit Sault in Edmundston, NB, and

Fort Ingall in Cabano, Qc. The MAHC plans to offer another such program for teachers and the public through UMFK during the Spring semester.

What does the future hold for MAHC and the Acadian people of the St. John Valley? The Congrès mondial acadien 2014 brought great visibility to Acadians of northern Maine. 97% of visitors said they would come back to this region because they loved the people. It's up to us to use this momentum to create something lasting that will both highlight our heritage and language while spurring economic and cultural development.

Who is MAHC?

The Maine Acadian Heritage Council is a regional organization dedicated to preserving and promoting Acadian culture, language, and history throughout Northern Maine's St. John Valley. Its members include representatives of: all the municipalities, chambers of commerce, historical and cultural societies, and sponsors of the Upper St. John Valley. It also includes a representative of: the Maine Bureau of Parks and Lands, the University of Maine System, Congressman Bruce Poliquin, and Senators Susan Collins and Angus King.

What is MAHC?

In 1990, the United States Congress passed the Maine Acadian Culture Preservation Act establishing a role for the National Park Service to recognize the important contribution to American culture and history by the Acadians in Maine. In 1991, the Maine Acadian Culture Preservation Commission, led by Senators George Mitchell and Bill Cohen, and Maine Speaker of the House John Martin, was developed to provide advice on the selection of sites for interpretation and preservation. In 1997, the National Park Service implemented the Maine Acadian Heritage Council as a nonprofit 501 (c) (3), as an umbrella organization coordinating the regional network of partnerships by which Maine Acadian culture is to be preserved and interpreted.

Since 1998, the MAHC has been fortunate to receive financial support from the National Park Service (NPS) on an annual basis, allowing the people of the St. John Valley to continue their work in preserving and promoting the Maine Acadian culture and its historic treasures.



On behalf of Maine Woods Company LLC, I wish to submit our annual summary of operations for 2015. It was a busy year for MWC with many capital expenditures for the continued quality improvement of our product. Along with the development of a Quality Assurance Program we invested 2.4 million dollars in capital improvements including 1.7 million on a new grading line for our kiln dried lumber. This grading line completed in late September has added 8 new jobs and has already brought us closer to achieving our goal of being one of the premier hardwood sawmills in the northeast.

Our Safety program has again paid off with a continued culture of safety resulting in no loss time accidents for 2015 and we had our membership in the OSHA SHARP program renewed for 2 more years.

The market for low grade lumber continued to drop throughout 2015 bringing lumber prices downward across all markets. This was caused by several factors, the poor housing markets both for new homes and remodeling, poor demand from China because of their weakening economy and our exchange rate with Canada which is a traditional market for flooring grade lumber. It has been a benefit to be affiliated with Moosewood Millworks that continues to grow their business based on the same quality concept. We have grown our marketing and sales staff to combat these issues.

We are very optimistic that the moves we have made have given us the tools to improve sales based on shipping a consistent, quality product to our customers resulting in repeat business.

All of us at MWC appreciate the continued support of all the citizens of Portage Lake.

2015 TIF Report

The TIF Retained Revenues experienced some changes during fiscal year 2015, including the approved expenditure of a portion of the funds.

The current TIF Agreement with Maine Woods Company, LLC, which went into effect in 1999, provides for the town's TIF Retained Revenues to accumulate at the rate of 0% for the first five years, 25% for the second five years, 50% the next five and 75% during the last five years of the twenty-year TIF Agreement. 2015 was the 17th year of the agreement and the second year that Portage retained 75% of the mill's tax commitment.

The beginning balance for 2015 was \$145,687.88 (\$145,162.88 savings and \$525.00 checking).

\$57,259.40 was added to the account from the town's 75% portion of retained tax revenue for 2015 from Maine Woods Company, LLC.

Interest earned in 2015 was \$584.99, resulting in a 12/31/2015 total balance of \$203,532.27.

The TIF Advisory Committee recommended that the proposed 2015 resurfacing of West Road from the intersection of Route 11 to the Maine Woods Company entrance road be partially funded by the TIF account. This was an approved expenditure per the State of Maine DECD. The expenditure of "up to" \$190,000 from the TIF account was authorized by Article 4 at the special town meeting held on 01/21/2015.

The total cost for this project was \$199,094.11. \$48,000 was paid by the state to the town of Portage for use towards this project. The balance of \$151,094.11 will be expended from the TIF savings account in the future as the payments on the \$350,000 loan come due.

The current usable balance of the TIF account (subtracting the future loan payments) is \$52,438.16.

Portage Town Forest Report - 2015

During the calendar year of 2015, there was timber harvesting on 160 acres of the town's 8,073 forested acres. The harvests' took place on the common undivided lands about 2 miles west of the Maine Woods Company mill. The winter harvests' were in softwood dominated stands and included overstory removals and riparian zone harvests. The summer harvests' were in mixedwood stands and was focused on softwood & poor quality hardwood removal as a multiple entry harvest.

We also harvested a bit more along the edge of the new snowmobile trail to facilitate the excavator work being done to make that an all season trail.
